Dr. Glasberg was chief resident in surgery at University of Connecticut/Hartford Hospital, and chief resident in plastic surgery at SUNY Health Science Center in Brooklyn. He is a Craniofacial Research Fellow, Institute of Reconstructive Plastic Surgery, New York University Medical Center, and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons. He is also Diplomate of the American Board of Plastic Surgery, the American Board of Surgery, and the National Board of Medical Examiners.

Dr. Glasberg is a member of numerous professional organization and hospital committees.

APPOINTED TO MAC

Dr. Hago M. Morales, MD, an otolaryngologist in Albany, NY, was confirmed to the NYS Medical Advisory Committee (MAC). The MAC consists of 20 members (10 are physicians) appointed by Governor Pataki, with Senate approval for a term of three years. The MAC advises the Governor on health and medical issues in New York State.

Dr. Morales received his medical degree from the University of Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, South Africa, and completed a residency in general otolaryngology from the University of Pennsylvania Center and a residency in otolaryngology from the University of North Shore in New York City, Cornell University Medical College in Manhasset.

DR ROTMAN RECEIVES GOLD MEDAL

Marvin Rotman, MD, of SUNY Downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn, has been chosen to receive the Gold Medal from the American Society for Therapeutic Radiology and Oncology (ASTRO). Dr. Rotman was recognized for his cutting-edge develop-

ments in the treatment of gynecological cancer and choroidal melanoma and for his participation in national organizations dedicated to clinical research in the field of cancer. Dr. Rotman is a leader in developing cancer treatments that combine continuous infusion chemotherapy and radiation therapy.

Dr. Rotman, a graduate of Ursinus College and of the Thomas Jefferson University School of Medicine, did his internship at the Albert Einstein Medical Center in Philadelphia, and his residency at that institution and at Montefiore Hospital and Medical Center in the Bronx. He was certified by the American Board of Radiology in 1966 and recertified by the American Board of Radiology in 1999.

He was professor and chairman of the Department of Radiation Oncology at New York Medical College and later at the State University of New York.

Dr. Rotman has served as president of the American Radium Society, president of the Society of Chairmen of Academic Radiation Oncology Programs, president of the New York Cancer Society, president of the New York Roentgen Ray Society, and counselor and vice counselor of the New York Chapter of the American College of Radiology.
